

My name is Louie Ceriani.

I was in the Class of 1948, and I have lived in Dexter for 90 years. I came to Dexter in 1928. Yes, I am now 91 years old.

The story you're about to read is true (to the best of my knowledge!).

Ninety-one years ago, I was born not far from here in a two-room house without electricity or running water. The last of six children, I was born with crippled arms and legs.

This was during the Depression and jobs were scarce. My father, born in Italy, struggled to support his young wife and family. Unable to care for a handicapped child, they placed me in foster care.

My new home was on a farm in Dexter. Under the care of my foster parents, I began to undergo surgeries to correct my condition, finally learning to walk at age six.

Because of my many surgeries, I fell behind in school. Adding to the many hardships I experienced, my foster mother died when I was sixteen.

In school, I was much more interested in sports than school work. When coach **Don Wilbur** made me manager of the teams, I finally had a reason to stay in school, managing the famous 1946 Dexter Football team, who were undefeated and un-scored upon, with star players like **Duane Devlin, Carl Johnson, Bill Devlin, George Kielwasser, Tom Bennett, Dean Coy, Francis DeLaTorre, Big Ed DeLaTorre, Dale Bailey, Bob Schultz, Robert Schultz, and Roger Williams**.

There was a lot of excitement in school (and the whole community!) on game day. First, there would be the pep rally in the gym with the players, the cheerleaders, and pep talks from the coaching staff. After school, there would be pep rallies on Main Street downtown. And later, the whole town would be empty because everyone was at the game.

The most memorable game was against Pinckney. Dexter was ahead 24 to nothing. It was fourth down with one yard to go, and Pinckney was determined to score.

Pinckney's best running back was no match for **Big Ed DeLaTorre**, who came busting through the line and stopped their running back short of the goal line. End of game. I'll never forget that as long as I live.

Dexter became league champions and were considered Class C state champions, too. I was manager all four years and earned my letter.

One especially great moment was at the football banquet during **Don Wilbur's** last year as coach. The banquet was in the school gym, which was packed with football moms and dads and the town's people who had come to celebrate.

Coach Wilbur had invited three University of Michigan players: quarterback **Pete Elliott**, running back **Bob Nussbaumer**, and **Bob Ufer**. Now I was really excited. Just seeing those Michigan players – wow!

The time came for **Coach Wilbur** to give his speech. He began to tell about one member of the team who meant so much to the team all year long. He went on to tell stories about this team member, finally saying that the team member was...me!

This made me so happy. All of the University of Michigan players came over to shake my hand. And why? Why did the coach recognize me? After all, I had never carried the ball or scored a touchdown. He did it for one reason only: to keep me in school.

I did graduate at the age of twenty-one. And now you know the rest of the story.
